



Our History

Beginning as "PRIA" in 1982, the Poppy Reserve Interpretive Association was formed by Antelope Valley residents to fund interpretive projects for the fledgling Antelope Valley California Poppy Reserve State Park. Many of the founding members were also members of the Lancaster Woman's Club, a group instrumental in the effort to create a park for poppies in the Antelope Valley. When the Jane Pinheiro Interpretive Center opened at the park, PRIA began operating the center's gift shop with proceeds going to benefit park operations.



Eventually, it became clear that other parks in the Mojave Sector needed financial and interpretive assistance. Four state parks were added under the organization's umbrella, and "Mojave Desert" was added to the name, creating "PRMDIA" in 1994.

Since its formation, PRMDIA has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars and donated thousands of hours to benefit our local California State Parks and the visiting public.

Cooperating Associations

California State Parks has a valuable relationship with more than 80 cooperating associations statewide. These nonprofit charitable organizations are dedicated to enhancing the educational and interpretive programs in California State Parks.

Associations have a contract with the state parks they serve, but operate as independent organizations. They are governed by a volunteer board of directors.

Projects Funded by PRMDIA

Prevention of closure of Saddleback Butte State Park by enlisting public support and acquiring grants

Provide support for the reopening of Providence Mountain - Mitchell Caverns

Upgrade park trails, picnic areas and campground features

Repair park buildings including window, lighting and roof replacement

Purchase and fabrication of exhibits such as display panels, taxidermy, herbarium collection and audio-visual equipment
