Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot announced the selection of four mixeduse INVEST South/West projects planned for areas in South Chicago, North Lawndale, Bronzeville, and New City and additional collaborations with three minority-led developers.

The projects, which are valued at approxi-mately \$200 million, were selected in response were selected in response to a second round of Request for Proposals issued by the Depart-ment of Planning and Development last winter. The RFP selections will collectively create more collectively create more than 215 residential units, 40,000 square feet of commercial space, and approximately 900 per-manent and temporary jobs on commercial corridor sites that are either vacant or underutilized.

The three additional minority-led proposals planned for City-owned locations will create additional residential units, new commercial space, and more than 100 new hotel rooms.

The RFPs' responses were subject to a review process that included neighborhood roundtables and selection teams comprised of City of Chicago staff and community-based evaluators. Final selections were based on responsiveness to the goals of each RFP, developer experience and capacity, development team diversity, communi-ty wealth-building components, proposed designs, financial viabili-ty, community feedback, and other criteria.

The Healthy Chicago 2025 report identifies opioid-related overdose deaths as among the top drivers of the 8.8-year life expectancy gap between Black and white Chicagoans. Fentanyl,

highly potent and deadly in small concentrations, continues to be the predominant type for opioid overdose deaths. In January – June 2021, overdose death rates involving fentanyl as the only opioid increased by

6%. Overdoses continue to be concentrated on the West Side of Chicago. Austin had the highest number of overdose EMS responses during this period, followed by West Garfield Park and Humboldt Park.

Although in Chicago overall there was a decrease in opioid-related overdose EMS response, there were increases on the South Side, as well, and opioid-related overdoses have impacted all 77 community areas.





New Indoor Mask Mandate

The Chicago Depart-ment of Public Health will re-institute a face mask mandate for all indoor public settings as the average number of daily cases of new COVID-19 surpasses 400. All individuals aged 2 and over, regardless of their vaccination status, will be required to wear a mask while indoors in public settings.

Masks are required in all indoor public settings, including bars and restaurants, gyms, common areas of condos and multi-residential buildings, and private clubs. Masks can be removed at restaurants, bars and other eating/drinking establishments by patrons. Masks can be removed by employees in settings that are not open to the public, if employees are static and maintaining at least six feet from all other individuals.

Masks also remain mandatory on public transportation, in healthcare settings, schools, and correctional and congregate settings. The new public health order does not include capacity limits at public places. and masking remains optional in outdoor settings, where the risk of COVID-19 transmission is lower. Masks are recommended for unvacciindividuals in nated crowded outdoor settings.






