Pappas Unveils Debt Burden

By contrast, the debt on properties in more affluent, lower-tax areas, like Barrington Hills and Winnetka, falls below 10% of the value of the properties in those locaproperties in those loca-

That exercise revealed the burden of local govthe burden of local gov ernment debt varies greatly, with generally heavier burdens in lessaffluent suburbs where the populations are more than 50% Black or Latino. The taxes tend to be much higher in many of those minority areas, an indication that more debt leads to higher propertv taxes.

Dart created a spe-cialized unit in 2012 to look for missing youth in the care of the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services as he also called for a state audit into how the agency was handling missing and abducted children. The results of

that audit revealed that previous DCFS administrations often failed to report missing youth in a timely manner and sometimes were not reported at all.

The National Center for Missing & Exploited Children reports one in six endangered runways in America to be likely sex trafficking victims. As of May 25th, there were more than 150 missing youth in care with outstanding judicial

orders to find them. In 2016, DCFS child welfare specialists began partnering with Sheriff's Police under the Child Rescue Unit to locate missing youth in care -afirst-of-its-kind unit in the state to address the problem. The CRU also assists the Chicago Children's Advocacy Center and provides human trafficking awareness training to social services agencies

throughout the county. The most recent youth in care located by the CRU were two girls, ages



Washington street, to reclaim two lost interiors deco-rated by the Tiffany Glass and Decorating Company: the Grand Army of the Republic Memorial Hall and Rotunda.

The museum-quality restoration of the art glass dome and decorative finishes is made possible by a generous grant of services valued at \$15,425,000 to the City. The Chicago Cultural Čenter is home two magnificent to stained-glass domes; the restoration of the Tiffany dome in Preston Bradley Hall was completed in 2008. Restoration work will continue until early 2022.

The grant provides access to a specialized team that are qualified to un-dertake the restoration. An intricate process will expose the original 1890s surfaces by methodically separating layers of paint. The project also includes the conservation of a 40foot diameter, 62,000-piece art glass dome that will return natural light that has been blocked since a renovation in the 1930s. Long-lost lighting fixtures that were custom designed for the rooms will be recreated using early photographs and architectural original drawings.

When completed next year, the rooms will reflect their historic appearance, but also facilitate a wider range of free and diverse cultural program-ming. This includes upgraded lighting, electrical, Wi-Fi and opportunifor artists and ties organizations to proviode a variety of performances and exhibitions.
