## Veterans Day, 11th Hour of 11/11



By Dr. R. Pletsch Ronald Reagan was one of the 31 Presidents out of our soon to be 46, to have served in the military. Though he publicly admitted that he was embarrassed at never serving in combat with being talked about as a WWII Veteran. During a radio announcement in 1983, President Reagan stated "Veterans know better than anyone else the price of freedom for they've suffered the stress of war. We can

offer them no better tribute than to protect what they have won for us". Ĭ, like many my age, have known many combat Vets and know many people that have the terrible weight of knowing friends and family who have died or have been severely wounded. Many my age have known people involved in WWII, Korea and Viet Nam. 16 million Americans served million Americans served during WWII with less than 300,000 now surviving. 7 million served in Viet Nam and 2 million fought in Korea. Among these staggering numbers, about 9% women. It was not until many years after WWII that my father ever talked about it and then usually with other Vets or

Paratroopers. He said that most who talked about combat were never really there.

Veterans Day was first

known as Armistice Day commemorating the end of WWI, where a peace treaty was signed during the 11th hour of November 11th. Then on that date in 1921, President Harding presided at the first cere-mony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Cemetery. Arlington Arlington Cemetery.
Arlington is now looked at as America's Cemetery with almost 400,000, mostly Vets, and truly one of the most inspiring locations for any locations for any American. Sometimes it takes recent immigrants to understand it best. My daughter, who is now a food scientist, who in 1995 when we were visiting Arlington, looked at the rows of crosses, and as only a six year old could say, "My God, Dad, all those people died so I could be an American

So whether it was a relative or friend or friend of a relative, we truly are "The Home of the Free, because of the Brave". Thank you Vets, those who left behind in the distant battlefields to the distant battlefields, to those who worked in the homefront. I try to say thanks to those proud enough to wear a Vets cap or join a VFW or American Legion or their auxiliaries. All time served was useful. I had a neighbor, now deceased, who was in the Army in WWII as a truck driver. When I asked him if he was in Normandy, he said yes, but got there on D-Day plus 2. Then finally my Dad told him that he did what he was asked to do. He said I had a brother who was stationed in New Jersey and a cousin who was stationed in Tennessee. We did what we could do. Thanks to all our Vets, whether they served in peace or wartime.

## **Housing Grants**

The City of Chicago's Mortgage and Rental Assistance Program offer financial relief to those who have been impacted by the economic fallout from the pandemic.

**Chicago Offers** 

Hoemowners must reside within the city limits; provide a government issued ID; must demonstrate total household income was at 120% or below the Area Mediain Income prior to March 1st. Renters must demonstrate total household income was at 60% or below the Medium Income prior to March 1st. to determine income eligibility and must experience a change in your financial state after March 1st due to the COVID-19 crisis. Tenants whose appli-

cation is approved will receive a one-time grant of \$5,000 paid to their landlord to cover missed rent payments beginning March 2020 and prepay payments through December 2020, or until the \$5,000 is exhausted.

Approved homeowners will receive a grant for up to \$15,000 to cover missed mortgage payments beginning as early as March 2020 and prepay mortgage payments through December 2020.

#### **12,623 New Cases** of COVID-19

The Illinois Department of Public Health on Tuesday, reported 12,623 new confirmed cases of coronavirus disease in Illinois, including 79 additional deaths.

Cook County fatalities were 1 female 40s, 1 male 40s, 1 female 50s, 1 male 50s, 1 male 60s, 2 females 70s, 3 males 70s, 4 females 80s, 3 males 80s, 1 female 90s and 2 males 90s.

Currently, IDPH is reporting a total of 511,183 cases, including 10,289 deaths, in 102 counties. Laboratories have reported 101,955 specimens for a total 8,571,019 and 4,742 peole were reported to be in the hospital with COVID-19. Of those, 911 patients were in the ICU and patients were on ventilators.

### Earned Income Credit For State Tax Payers

The Pritzker administration and Illinois Department of Revenue commenced a new outreach initiative to increase Earned Income Credit participation by targeting taxpayers who qualified but failed to claim the credit. Targeted taxpayers will receive a letter confirming their edicibility estimating a eligibility, estimating a refund amount and instructing them how to finalize their claim.

Most households are eligible for the federal EITC if they earn less than \$55,952. The Illinois EIC is a refundable tax credit automatically available to federally eligible households and is worth up to 18 percent of taxpayer's federal claim. In 2020, an eligible Illinois household could be due a refund of up to

Eligible taxpayers must meet income and residency qualifications and file a tax return, even if they do not owe any tax or are not required to file. The Internal Revenue Service recommends that all workers who earned around \$55,952 or less learn about eligibility and use the EITC Assistant to

find out if they qualify.

Federally, eligible families with three or more qualifying children

could get a maximum credit of up to \$6,557. EITC for people without children could mean up to \$529 added to their tax refund. For more information

#### **Efforts To Reduce Vet Suicide**

The State of Illinois will join the Governor's Challenge to Prevent Suicide, a national effort that champions mental health support and preventative services for Veterans.

The State is dedicating \$2 million to the initiative, in partnership with the federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration and the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs.

In 2019, suicide was the 12th leading cause of death among Illinois residents of all ages, but 3rd leading cause of death among those aged 1-24

"Our Veterans are heroes who served us bravely and deserve quality care here at home, including robust mental health services," Governor JB Pritzker.

## Free Assistance For College Aid

The Illinois Student Assistance Commission has extended the campaign to provide free college and financial aid planning support to stu-dents and families through Thanksgiving.

All graduating seniors attending public high schools in Illinois must complete the FAFSA, or if they are ineligible for federal aid, the Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid, as a prerequisite to receiving a high school diploma.

The 2021-22 Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid provides a pathway to MAP grants for some undocumented students or for transgender who may be ineligible for federal student aid because they did not register for selective service.

#### Safety Tips For **Holiday Season**

As the holidays approach, the Illinois Department of Public Health is offering recommendations on how to

celebrate safer during the COVID-19 pandemic.
"COVID-19 has changed the way we work, live, and play, and will now change have to be compared to the control of the control will now change how we plan to celebrate the holidays," said IDPH Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike. "While the safest way to celebrate is with members of your household and connecting with others virtually, we know, for many, the holidays are all about family and friends, so we want to provide some tips on how to celebrate safer."

Traveling by plane, train, or bus can mean standing in lines and sitting less than 6 feet from people. Traveling by car may include stops along the way for gas, food, and

bathroom break.
During a holiday gathering, limit the number of guests and have as many activities outside as weather permits. If the gathering needs to be held inside, increase air flow by partially opening windows.

Try gift shopping online at local store websites and choosing picksites and choosing pick-up options. Grocery shopping online with delivery and curbside pick-up is also available. If you need to shop in-person, go when stores are not as busy.

Think about the seat-ing arrangements for

ing arrangements for meals. Keep members of the same household together and try to put space between one family and another.
Avoid a buffet-style or

potluck setting and consider having one person serve all the food so that multiple people are not handling serving uten-

sils.

If you are sick, do not travel and attend gatherings. Even if symptoms are mild, you may still be able to infect others.

#### **Contact Tracing Data Available**

The Illinois Department of Public Health reports that COVID-19 data related to the state's contact tracing operation is available at http://www. dph.illinois.gov/covid19/ contact-tracing. This includes statewide data related to outbreaks and exposure locations as well as school-level data in both categories. As of late October, 57 of the 97 local health departments are reaching out to more than 90 percent of cases and 86 of the 97 are reaching out to 75 percent or more.

One of the challenges with contact tracing is the public's reluctance to answer a phone call from a number they don't recognize. To make it easier for Illinois residents to identify when a contact tracer is attempting to make contact, all calls made by contact tracers have the caller ID "IL COVID HELP.

The state will publish data representing outbreaks and exposure locations for cases of COVID-19 in a variety of setting types, to be up-

dated on a weekly basis. In this first batch of released data, an outbreak is defined as five or more cases that are linked to a specific setting during a 14-day period. Linked cases must be from different households and not already connected from other sources. While certain settings like a college campus, a factory, or group home make it easier to determine an out-

establishments that are frequented by the public, like restaurants or grocery stores, are harder to determine as the setting of an outbreak.

#### **Organ Tissue Donor Registration**

Secretary of State Jesse White announced that the state's organ/tissue donor registry reached a milestone of 7

million registrants. There are 10,764,540 individuals in Illinois who qualify to become organ/tissue donors. Of those, 65 percent have registered as organ/tissue donors.

More than 100,000 16and 17-year-olds have registered with the program since 2018. Residents can register







## Extend Moratorium For Utilities

The Illinois Commerce Commission announced the moratorium on disconnections has voluntarilv been extended by several state regulated utilities through the Winter 2021 for eligible lowresidential income customers, and those who self-report to utilities that they are experiencing financial or COVID-19 hardship. Previously, several of the utilities had voluntarily agreed to extend the moratorium on shutoffs for residential customers until Sept.

At the request of the

ICC, the following utilities have committed to extending the moratorium on utility disconnections for low-income (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program qualified) residential customers and those financially impacted by COVID-19 until March 31, 2021: Ameren Illinois, Aqua Illinois, Illinois American Water, Commonwealth Edison. Peoples Gas and North Shore Gas, and Utility Services of Illinois. MidAmerican will voluntarextend moratorium on disconnections for Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program qualified residential customers through March 31, 2021 and is further considering additional options to help their customers during this unprecedented time. Additionally, Nicor Gas and Liberty Utilities have agreed to extend the moratorium on disconnections for all residential customers until March

31, 2021. The ICC reminds customers to call the utility company if you have missed bill payments or you are struggling to pay your bill. No documentation or written proof is necessary, but you must make the phone call and verbalize your difficulty. This action will ensure a continuation of utility service. Deferred payment arrangements are also available for residential and small business customers needing help managing their utility bill obligation.

## Job Training For Unemployed

### School Councils Hold Elections

To ensure school communities are able to have their voices heard safely during the COVID-19 pandemic, updates have been made to 2020 Local School Council (LSC) elections

All parents, legal guardians, or temporary custodians of a CPS student are eligible to vote at their student's respective school.

Elections are also open to any community members who are 17 years or older and reside in a respective school's attendance area or voting district, even if they do not have any children enrolled at the school.

To ensure all eligible voters are able to participate safely, there is a mail-in ballot option for parents, guardians and staff members in addition to in-person voting. Students will use a virtual-only ballot system.

Because the district

Because the district does not have a roster of all residents living within an attendance boundary, community members will vote in-person, with enhanced health and safety measures.

All in-person voters will be required to wear a cloth face covering, sanitize their hands, maintain social distancing, and complete a health screener and temperature check before entering the building.

building.

Inside the building, voters will be protected by sneeze guards and other physical barriers and see signage throughout school facilities to emphasize new policies and procedures.

Curbside voting will be available for individuals with disabilities, individuals who cannot or forgot to wear a mask, and individuals who choose not to enter the polling place

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White announced that expiration dates for driver's licenses and ID cards have been extended an additional three months until Feb. 1st, 2021. This new extension also includes those who have November, December and January expiration dates.

Customers who can conduct business online may go to www.cyberdriveillinois.com to take advantage of online services – such as renewing license plate stickers, obtaining a duplicate driver's license or ID card, obtaining a driving record abstract or renewing a standard driver's license through the Safe Driver renewal program.
