



Support Your Principal

The Chicago Public elementary schools are expected to further open on Monday. The news will probably deal more with attendance and the Union response defending those that want to continue to stay at home. The numbers do not matter and everyone will call it either a victory or failure, pick your partner. What should not be argued is the "follow the science". 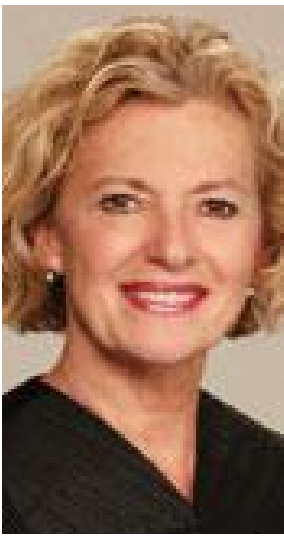
strators Association. But it is not a union, only an association. Because of this, it is often ignored.

Every school has different configurations. The number and size of classrooms is very important. The Principal must arrange and be responsible for all protocols for safety. We must also recall that many parents just drop in but they expect to be treated with the dignity they are entitled to and, for some reason, always expect the Principal to be in the office. Temporary Orders For Eviction Cases

Chief Justice Anne M. Burke and the Illinois Supreme Court announced two new temporary orders and one amended order regarding eviction cases and electronic signatures in Illinois courts. The orders were first proposed by the Illinois Judicial Conference Court Operations During COVID19 Task Force to address the anticipated surge of evictions once the moratoria expire and improve access to justice for self-represented litigants.

"The Court would like to thank the Task Force for its extensive work on the evictions issue," Chief Justice Anne M. Burke said. "This was done in the true spirit of collaboration to address challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic."

The first new order authorizes and encourages every Illinois judicial circuit to establish early resolution programs to allow for alternative dispute resolution of eviction cases, such as mediation and online dispute resolution. The circuits may choose to make such programs voluntary or it may require mandatory participation by litigants as a prerequisite to hearing.

In response to the Court's request for ideas to address the eviction crisis, the Task Force convened a subcommittee made up of representatives from all areas of the state and from the following groups: judges, legal aid organizations, bar associations, Illinois Department of Human

Services, Illinois Housing Development Authority, legal non-profit foundations, tenant and landlord attorneys, tenant associations, landlord associations, sheriff's offices, court staff, alternative dispute resolution organizations, and the Winnebago County Board.

Courts are directed to resources and sample materials to develop their own Eviction Early Resolution Programs.

"When the State and Federal eviction moratoriums come to an end, we anticipate a surge of pentup eviction filings," Chief Judge Eugene Doherty said. "Our committee felt that it was important to encourage circuits to consider alternative dispute resolution programs as a way to help deal with the surge and to help landlords and tenants connect to the financial assistance that is available to them."

The second new order states that al courts shall accept all electronically and conventionally filed documents (as defined in the Supreme Court of Illinois Electronic Signature Standards) that are electronically or digitally signed provided the signature and document comply with M.R. 18368.

This order is intended to promote remote pro bono and self-help services as well as reduce incourt traffic and achieve uniformity in the state with regards to documents that are filed bearing the electronic signature "/s/ Name."

The third order amends the order approved in May 2020, "In re: Illinois Courts Response to COVID-19 Emergency". The amendment states that eviction cannot commence against a "covered person" (defined as a tenant, lessee, sub-lessee, or resident of a residential property who provides to their landlord a qualifying declaration) who does not owe rent unless that person poses a direct threat to the health and safety of other tenants or an immediate and severe risk to property.

If a plaintiff or landlord wishes to challenge the accuracy of a declaration of a "covered person", they need to file a motion with the court requesting a hearing on that issue at the time when a complaint and certification form are filed.

1,665 New Cases Of COVID-19

The Illinois Depart-ment of Public Health re-ported 1,665 new confirmed and probable cases of coronavirus dis-ease (COVID-19) includ-ing 27 additional deaths.

Cook County fatalities: 1 female 40s, 1 male 60s, 2 females 70, 8 males 70s and 1 female 90s.

Currently, IDPH is re-porting a total of 1,177,320 cases, including 20,330 deaths, in 102 counties. Laboratories have reported 61,400 specimens for a total of 17,721,561. 1,488 indi-viduals were reported to be in the hospital with 361 in the ICU and 172 on ventilators.

The preliminary seven-day statewide posi-tivity for cases as a per-cent of total test from Feb. 16th–22nd is 2.8%.

Plate Readers For X-Way Shootings

The Illinois Depart-ment of Transportation will provide \$12.5 million to the Illinois State Police for the purchase and in-stallation of automated li-cense plate readers and software to aid in the in-vestigation of Cook County expressway shoot-ings.

ALPR installations at 47 locations will include specialized cameras to read the license plate numbers of vehicles mov-ing in traffic. The installa-tions will also include a communication system to backhaul the video im-ages to a central location where additional software is used to query and match license plates to ex-isting license plate and vehicle databases.

The grant will cover the costs of engineering, permitting, and labor as-sociated with the pur-chase and installation of readers, controllers, servers/software, elec-trical power, and commu-nications equipment.

The Tamara Clayton Expressway Camera Act (Expressway Camera Act) was signed into law on July 12, 2019 and became effective on Jan. 1, 2020. On Feb. 4, 2019, Ms. Clay-ton was on her way to work when she was tra-gically shot and killed while driving on Interstate 57 near Cicero Avenue. ISP investigators responded and the investigation into her death remains open and ongoing.

The Expressway Cam-era Act requires the ISP, IDOT, and Illinois State Toll Highway Authority to conduct a program to in-crease the number of cam-eras along expressways in Cook County. The images from these cameras will not be used for petty of-fenses, such as speeding.

As of Feb. 10th, 2021, a total of 27 expressway shootings on the Cook County area expressway systems has been re-ported; 11 resulted in in-juries, 3 shootings with fatalities, and a total of 14 victims. In 2020, there were 128 reported ex-pressway shootings, with 49 injuries, 7 fatalities and 72 gunshot victims. In 2019, the total number of reported expressway shootings was 52; with 21 injuries, 3 fatalities and 35 victims.

Transformation For Criminal Justice

Building on efforts to create a more equitable and safe criminal justice system, Governor JB Pritzker signed legislation that transforms Illinois' criminal justice system. This ends a pretrial de-tention system that bene-fits the wealthy, expands training and wellness pro-grams for law enforce-ment, modernizes sentencing laws, and pri-oritizes treatment and re-habilitation for low-level drug crimes.

House Bill 3653 ex-pands safety, fairness, and justice by transform-ing the state's criminal justice system and enact-ing statewide police re-forms through the following: Moves Illinois from a system of pretrial detention that prioritizes wealth, to one that priori-tizes public safety.

Diverts low-level drug crimes into substance use programs and treatments.

Modernizes sentencing laws and streamlines the victims' compensation system.

Requires more invest-ments in officer training, mental health, and officer wellness.

Expands training op-portunities for officers, re-quires health and wellness services for offi-cers, and protects officers from unjust lawsuits based on their reasonable actions.

Sets statewide stan-dards on use of force,

crowd control responses, de-escalation, and arrest techniques.

Requires the use of body-worn cameras by po-lice departments statewide.

Professionalizes polic-ing through the creation of a more robust certifica-tion system and lays out clear standards and processes for decertifica-tion.

Expands accountabil-ity across police depart-ments by requiring the permanent retention of police misconduct records and removes the sworn af-fidavit requirement when filing police misconduct complaints.

Requires police depart-ments to develop plans to protect vulnerable people present during search warrant raids.

Eliminates license sus-pensions for unpaid fines and fees due to red light camera and traffic of-fenses.

Ends prison gerryman-dering.

Expands services for crime victims.

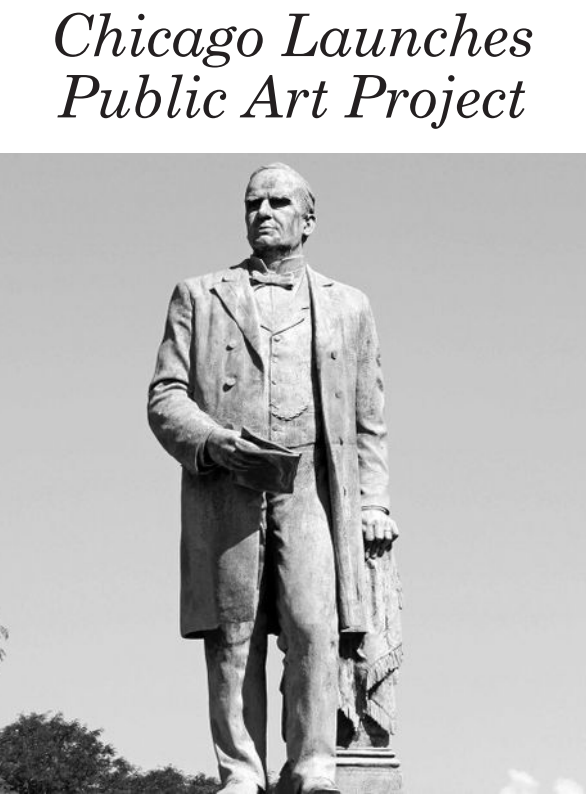

Reopening Plan For Park District

Chicago Park District General Superintendent & CEO Michael Kelly announced plans to reopen the city's lakefront, playgrounds and indoor aquatics programming as metrics allow the city to ease COVID-19 regulations.

As snow removal and clean up from recent storms continue along the lakefront, crews will begin opening public access points to parkland east of Lake Shore Drive. City Speed Cameras Now Activated

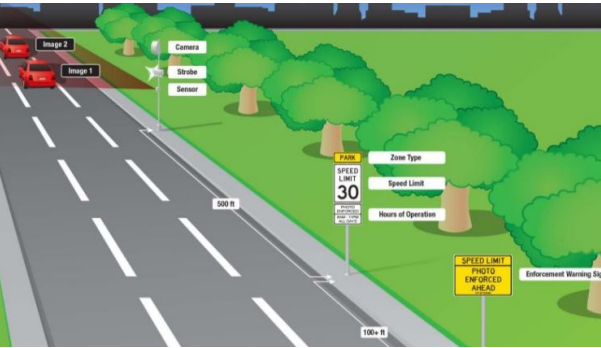

Speed cameras located near schools and parks in the City of Chicago will begin ticketing drivers for going 6-10 miles per hour over the limit starting in March.

Effective now, drivers going 6-10 mph over the limit in "Children's Safety Zones" will receive a warning by mail. After March 1st, speeders will be issued a \$35 ticket.

Over 11 mph will receive a \$100 fine. Areas which have a speed camera are marked by signs and usually have a limit of 30 mph. Those found near schools are generally enforced from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. while those in park zones are active from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m., 365 days a year.

Mayor Lori Lightfoot included "enhanced fine enforcement" changing the cameras' limits as part of a budget which aimed to address the city's \$1.2 billion shortfall.

Assistance Programs For Homeownership

Governor JB Pritzker announced the creation of two new programs designed to help bring additional assistance to working class families and underrepresented communities. Offered by the Illinois Housing Development Authority, the SmartBuy and Opening Doors programs were designed to aid communities of color, which have historically endured many barriers in their path toward homeownership.

Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs reported that than 2 million people carry student loan debt, the average value of which is \$29,855.

Borrowers must meet eligibility requirements established for IHDA's DPA programs, and homebuyer education is required.

IHDA Mortgage SmartBuy will provide a 30-year fixed rate first mortgage with a deferred \$5,000 for down payment and/or closing cost assistance. In addition, the program will provide 15% of the purchase price (up to \$40,000) in assistance for student loan debt relief to borrowers looking to buy a home and help build generational wealth.

Potential borrowers must have at least \$1,000 in student loan debt and must pay off their full remaining student loan balance at closing. The promissory note and deed restriction will have a term of 3 years, and if the borrowers sell the property within that time, they will need to sell to another borrower within IHDA's income and purchase price limits.

IHDA Mortgage Opening Doors is designed to

increase home purchase accessibility for low- and moderate-income qualified homebuyers. This includes Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals recipients. IHDA will provide a 30-year 1st mortgage with a fixed interest rate and \$6,000 in down payment and/or closing cost assistance. The down payment assistance is forgiven after five years.
