## ORDINANCE NO. 89-4

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT THE 1989 REPLACEMENT PAGES FOR THE MODEL OHIO MUNICIPAL CODE PUBLISHED BY THE JUSTINIAN PUBLISHING COMPANY; TO REPEAL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH AND TO DECLARE AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, during the year January 1, 1988, through December 31, 1988, the General Assembly enacted numerous State laws that affect the Model Ohio Municipal Code, previously adopted by the Municipality;

WHEREAS, the Municipality is in need of having an up to date Code, one which is consistent with the latest State law, as required by Article XVIII, Section 3, of the Ohio Constitution, so that prosecutions can continue to be made under Municipal ordinance rather than State statute; and

WHEREAS, The Justinian Publishing Company has published a set of 1989 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code, which Replacement Pages incorporate the latest State law through January 1, 1989, and, pursuant to authority previously given by the Municipality, has furnished the Municipality with sets of such Replacement Pages equal in number to the number of copies of the Model Code previously ordered by the Municipality;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF AMANDA, OHIO:


SECTION 1. Pursuant to Ohio R.C. 731.23, the 1989 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code, prepared and promulgated by The Justinian Publishing Company of Cleveland, Ohio, are hereby adopted by and for the Municipality.

SECTION 2. All ordinances, resolutions and parts of ordinances and resolutions which are in conflict with any of the provisions of the 1989 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code, adopted in Section 1 hereof, are hereby repealed. Those ordinances, resolutions and parts of ordinances and resolutions which are not in conflict with any provision of the 1989 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code are hereby expressly excepted from repeal by this ordinance and shall continue in full force and effect until otherwise amended or repealed by Council.

SECTION 3. The enactment of this ordinance, including the 1989 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code adopted herein and the repeal provided for in Section 2 hereof, shall not be construed to affect a right or liability accrued or incurred under any legislative provision prior to the date of such enactment, or any action or proceeding for the enforcement of such right or liability. Such enactment shall not be construed to relieve any person from punishment for an act committed in the violation of any such legislative provision, nor to affect an indictment or prosecution therefor. For such purposes, any such legislative provision shall continue in full force notwithstanding its repeal for the purpose of adoption of the 1989 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code provided for herein.

SECTION 4. Pursuant to Ohio R. C. 731.21, 731.22 and 731.23, the Clerk of Council shall cause to be published a notice of the enactment of this ordinance, containing the title of the ordinance and a summary of the new matter covered by it, which summary is attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A."

SECTION 5. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, the reason for the emergency being the necessity of having an up to date Code, one which is consistent with the latest State law, as required by the Ohio Constitution, and this ordinance, therefore, and the 1989 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code hereby adopted shall become effective immediately upon its passage by at least two-thirds of the members of Council, otherwise from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

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#### ORDINANCE NO. 90-7

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT THE 1990 REPLACEMENT PAGES FOR THE MODEL OHIO MUNICIPAL CODE PUBLISHED BY THE JUSTINIAN PUBLISHING COMPANY; TO REPEAL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH AND TO DECLARE AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, during the year January 1, 1989, through January 1, 1990, the General Assembly enacted numerous State laws that affect the Model Ohio Municipal Code, previously adopted by the Municipality;

WHEREAS, the Municipality is in need of having an up to date Code, one which is consistent with the latest State law, as required by Article XVIII, Section 3, of the Ohio Constitution, so that prosecutions can continue to be made under Municipal ordinance rather than State statute; and

WHEREAS, The Justinian Publishing Company has published a set of 1990 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code, which Replacement Pages incorporate the latest State law through January 1, 1990, and, pursuant to authority previously given by the Municipality, has furnished the Municipality with sets of such Replacement Pages equal in number to the number of copies of the Model Code previously ordered by the Municipality;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF AMANDA, OHIO:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to Ohio R.C. 731.23, the 1990 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code, prepared and promulgated by The Justinian Publishing Company of Cleveland, Ohio, are hereby adopted by and for the Municipality.

SECTION 2. All ordinances, resolutions and parts of ordinances and resolutions which are in conflict with any of the provisions of the 1990 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code, adopted in Section 1 hereof, are hereby repealed. Those ordinances, resolutions and parts of ordinances and resolutions which are not in conflict with any provision of the 1990 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code are hereby expressly excepted from repeal by this ordinance and shall continue in full force and effect until otherwise amended or repealed by Council.

SECTION 3. The enactment of this ordinance, including the 1990 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code adopted herein and the repeal provided for in Section 2 hereof, shall not be construed to affect a right or liability accrued or incurred under any legislative provision prior to the date of such enactment, or any action or proceeding for the enforcement of such right or liability. Such enactment shall not be construed to relieve any person from punishment for an act committed in the violation of any such legislative provision, nor to affect an indictment or prosecution therefor. For such purposes, any such legislative provision shall continue in full force notwithstanding its repeal for the purpose of adoption of the 1990 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code provided for herein.

SECTION 4. Pursuant to Ohio R.C. 731.21, 731.22 and 731.23, the Clerk of Council shall cause to be published a notice of the enactment of this ordinance, containing the title of the ordinance and a summary of the new matter covered by it, which summary is attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A."

SECTION 5. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, the reason for the emergency being the necessity of having an up to date Code, one which is consistent with the latest State law, as required by the Ohio Constitution, and this ordinance, therefore, and the 1990 Replacement Pages for the Model Ohio Municipal Code hereby adopted shall become effective immediately upon its passage by at least two-thirds of the members of Council, otherwise from and after the earliest period allowed by law.



The Sheriff of Fairfield County, Ohio, shall present his vouchers on the 10th day following the end of each month or before, for the number of days the prisoners have been confined to his jail by reason of this contract to the Clerk of the Village of Amanda, Ohio, who shall certify as to the correctness of the vouchers and shall take the appropriate steps to process payment to the Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio, in accordance with the vouchers presented. All bills must be current before Fairfield County will house prisoners.
- f. The term "twenty-four (24) hour day" as used in this contract is hereby defined to mean that the Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio shall be paid by prorating the time which will be pro-rated from 0001 hour until 1200 hour (1/2 day) and any person held past 1200 hour will be charged a full days' fee of \$40.00.
- g. The Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio, shall include in the cost of incarceration and detention, transportation of any individual prisoner incarcerated or detained pursuant to this contract to and from the Hall of Justice, East Main Street, Lancaster, Ohio 43130 for arraignment purposes by an officer or deputy of the Fairfield County Sheriff's Department. This provision shall not be construed as providing transportation to or from the Lancaster Municipal Court, however, for purposes of arraignment.
- h. This contract shall continue for a period of two (2) years beginning January 31st, 1991 and ending on January 31st, 1993.

#### CONTRACT

This Agreement, made at Lancaster, Ohio, this 31st day of January, 1991, between the Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio, and the Village of Amanda, Ohio.

SECTION 1: The Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio, in consideration of the promises and agreements of the Village of Amanda, Ohio, hereby promises and agrees with the Village of Amanda, Ohio to incarcerate, care for, and maintain the prisoners in the Fairfield County Jail that are prosecuted in the Common Pleas Court of Fairfield County, Ohio and the Lancaster Municipal Court, for the violation of the Ordinances of the Village of Amanda, Ohio for the sum of Forty Dollars (\$40.00) per day for each twenty-four (24) hour day that such a prisoner is incarcerated in the Fairfield County Jail.

SECTION 2: The Village of Amanda, Ohio, in consideration of the promises and agreements of the Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio, hereby promises and agrees with the Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio, that it will pay the Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio, the sum of Forty Dollars (\$40.00) per day for each twenty-four (24) hour day that a prisoner is incarcerated in the Fairfield County Jail under a sentence imposed in the Common Pleas Court of Fairfield County, Ohio, or the Municipal Court for the violation of an ordinance of the Village of Amanda, Ohio.

SECTION 3: It is mutually agreed between the Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio and the Village of Amanda, Ohio, that the Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio will incarcerate and maintain prisoners under the following terms and conditions for the period of this contract:

- a. The prisoners incarcerated under this contract shall be subject to the same rules and regulations as those prescribed by the Common Pleas Court of Fairfield County, Ohio, for the Fairfield County Jail.
- b. The Sheriff of Fairfield County, Ohio, shall receive and incarcerate all prisoners that are being prosecuted or that have been prosecuted and have been found guilty in the Common Pleas Court of Fairfield County, Ohio, and the Lancaster Municipal court for the violation of ordinances of the Village of Amanda, Ohio, and shall detain them according to the sentence imposed by the appropriate Court, or until otherwise released according to law.
- c. The Village of Amanda, Ohio shall pay all reasonable and necessary expenses incurred by the Board of County Commissioner of Fairfield County, Ohio, in habeas corpus proceedings brought by or against prisoners committed under this contract.
- d. The Village of Amanda, Ohio, shall pay all medical and hospital bills for prisoners committed to the Fairfield County Jail by reason of this contract.

### ORDINANCE REQUIRING CONNECTION WITH SEWAGE SYSTEM

WHEREAS, by previous action the Village of Amanda has determined to effect construction of a wastewater treatment facility for use by Village residents; and,

WHEREAS, to protect the health and safety of the Village residents mandatory connection to the Village public sewer system must be effected.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY OF THE VILLAGE OF AMANDA, OHIO:

that the owners of all houses, buildings, or properties used for human occupancy, employment, recreation, or other purposes situated within the Village and abutting any road, highway, street, alley, or right-of-way in which there is now located or may in the future be located a public sewer of the Village, are hereby required, at their expense, to install suitable toilet facilities, and to connect such facilities to the Village public sewer within ninety (90) days after the date of official notice to do so, provided that said Village public sewer is within three hundred (300) feet of the owners property line. This ordinance shall take effect at the earliest date permitted by law.

### ORDINANCE NO. 91-12

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$816,000 TEMPORARY SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM MORTGAGE REVENUE BONDS BY THE VILLAGE OF AMANDA, OHIO, PURSUANT TO SECTION 12, ARTICLE XVIII OF THE OHIO CONSTITUTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING PART OF THE COST OF CERTAIN SANITARY SEWER IMPROVEMENTS OF THE VILLAGE; PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION BY THE VILLAGE OF REVENUES FROM SAID SYSTEM SUFFICIENT FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COSTS OF OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF SAID BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE SEGREGATION AND DISTRIBUTION OF SAID REVENUES; PROVIDING FOR A MORTGAGE OF SAID SYSTEM AND A LIEN ON THE REVENUES THEREOF TO SECURE SAID BONDS; GRANTING OF A FRANCHISE UPON DEFAULT; AND FURTHER PROVIDING FOR THE RIGHTS OF THE HOLDERS OF SAID BONDS IN ENFORCEMENT THEREOF; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Village of Amanda, Ohio (the "Village") has heretofore determined it necessary to acquire, construct, own and operate, as a public utility, a sanitary sewer system (the "System") to serve the inhabitants of the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village anticipates that the cost of such System will be paid in part from a loan (the "FmHA Loan") from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration (the "FMHA") in the amount of \$816,000; and

WHEREAS, the FmHA has issued its closing instructions for the FmHA Loan and has requested the Village to provide interim financing which will be retired from the proceeds of the FmHA Loan; and

WHEREAS, this council has determined to issue temporary sanitary sewer system revenue bonds in anticipation of the receipt of the FmHA Loan, which temporary bonds are to be secured by a first lien on the funds derived from the FmHA Loan, and on the other revenues and properties of the System pursuant to Section 12, Article XVIII of the Constitution of Ohio, all as set forth herein;

WHEREAS, this council finds all conditions precedent to the issuance and sale of the herein authorized temporary mortgage revenue bonds have been met or can be met prior to the closing of the bond issue;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF AMANDA, COUNTY OF FAIRFIELD, STATE OF OHIO THAT:

SECTION 1. The Village shall proceed with the acquisition and construction of the System. This council hereby finds and determines that when said improvements are completed, the System shall continue to be operated as a public utility, including all extensions and improvements thereto and that rates and charges for the services of the System will be fixed in an amount sufficient to pay the costs of operating and maintaining the System and to provide an amount of revenues adequate for the payment of principal and interest, debt service reserve requirements, replacements and improvement requirements, and all other requirements of the System; and that it is necessary to issue and sell its Temporary Sanitary Sewer System Mortgage Revenue Bonds (hereinafter called the "Bonds") in the principal amount of \$816,000 and having the terms provided herein, the proceeds to be used for the purpose of paying part of the cost of acquiring and constructing the improvements to the System.

SECTION 2. This council hereby declares that the period of usefulness of the improvements to the System to be financed pursuant to this ordinance is forty (40) years from the date of completion of said improvements; and further ratifies and confirms the Village's application for and acceptance of the FmHA Loan, and all actions of Village officials and others relating to the acquisition and construction of the System and the application for and acceptance of the FmHA Loan.

SECTION 3. The Bonds shall be issued in fully registered form without interest coupons, shall be in the denomination of \$816,000, shall be numbered R-1 upward in order of issuance, and shall be dated the date of original issuance. There shall be no charge for registration or transfer. Bonds shall be negotiable instruments. The Bonds shall be registered on the books of the Village kept for that purpose by The Fifth Third Bank, Cincinnati, Ohio, as bond registrar and paying agent (the "Bond Registrar") upon presentation thereof, which registration shall be noted thereon by the Bond Registrar, and no transfer shall be valid unless made on said books. The Bonds shall be in the initial principal amount of \$816,000, and the outstanding principal amount of the Bonds shall bear interest at a rate of five and sixty-two hundredths

per centum (5.62%) per annum. The principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be payable at maturity and the Bonds shall mature not more than one year from their date of issuance. Interest on and principal of each Bond shall be payable to the registered holder upon presentation and surrender of the Bond at the office of the Bond Registrar. So long as any of the Bonds remain outstanding, the Village will maintain and keep at the office of the Bond Registrar, books for the registration and transfer of Bonds as provided in this ordinance. person in whose name any Bonds shall be registered on the registration books of the Village shall be regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes of this ordinance and payment of or on account of the principal of and interest on any Bonds shall be made only to or upon the order of such person or persons authorized by a power of attorney in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Bond Registrar, and neither the Village nor the Bond Registrar shall be affected by any notice to the contrary, but such registration may be changed as provided herein. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Bonds, including the interest thereon, to the extent of the amount or amounts so paid.

The Bonds shall be signed by the mayor and the clerk of the Village, provided, however, that one or both of such signatures may be facsimile signatures, and the corporate seal of the Village may be impressed thereon, provided, however, that such seal may be a facsimile seal. Any authority, officer or board which hereafter succeeds, by operation of law, to the powers and duties of the mayor or the clerk of the Village shall be deemed included in the applicable official designation while having such powers and duties. The Bonds shall bear the manual authenticating signature of an authorized representative of the Bond Registrar.

The Village shall upon request of the holder of each Bond, at any time at the expense of the Village, and within seven (7) days after such request, exchange Bonds for Bonds of any authorized denomination or denominations in an aggregate principal amount equal to the unmatured and unredeemed principal amount of, and bearing interest at the same rate and maturing on the same date or dates, as the Bonds being Bonds shall be so exchanged only for and upon exchanged. surrender to the Bond Registrar of the corresponding Bond or Bonds being exchanged which shall then immediately be cancelled by the Bond Registrar and returned to the Village. The Bonds shall be transferable, without charge to the holder, only on the registration books of the Village upon presentation to the Bond Registrar with a written transfer duly acknowledged by the registered holder or such holder's attorney and such transfer to be noted on the Bond.

SECTION 4. The Bonds hereby authorized, together with interest thereon, shall be secured by a first lien on the proceeds of the FmHA Loan and a first mortage upon the System and shall be payable solely from the proceeds of the FmHA Loan and the net income and revenue to be derived from the operation of the System, a sufficient portion of which to pay such principal and interest as and when the same shall become due is hereby pledged and shall continue to be set aside as needed for that purpose and identified as the "Sanitary Sewer Mortgage Revenue Bond Retirement Fund" as hereinafter specified. The proceeds of the FmHA Loan and the moneys deposited in such bond retirement fund are hereby pledged to pay such principal and interest.

SECTION 5. The clerk of the Village shall be custodian of all funds belonging to and/or associated with the System and such funds shall be deposited and invested as required by law. The clerk of the Village is hereby directed to create the following funds into which the bond proceeds and the revenues and income from the System shall be deposited, which funds shall be established and maintained in the custody of the Village except as otherwise provided so long as any Bond hereby authorized remains unpaid:

- A. CONSTRUCTION FUND. The proceeds of the Bonds hereby authorized shall be deposited in the Construction Fund which fund is hereby established to pay costs of acquiring and constructing the System. Such proceeds shall be withdrawn on the order of this council only on checks signed by the clerk of the Village for the purpose or purposes for which the Bonds were issued. When the construction of the improvements to the System has been completed and/or construction costs have been paid in full, any balance remaining in the Construction Fund shall be deposited in the Sanitary Sewer Mortgage Revenue Bond Retirement Fund and the Construction Fund shall be closed.
- B. SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE FUND. The gross income and revenues from the System shall be set aside into a separate fund to be designated the Sanitary Sewer System Revenue Fund (hereinafter called the "Revenue Fund"), which fund is hereby established and monies so deposited therein shall be expended and used only in the manner and order as follows:
- (1) Operation and Maintenance Fund. There shall be transferred each month from the Revenue Fund Fund a sufficient portion of the income and revenues to the Operation and Maintenance Fund, which such fund is hereby established to pay the reasonable and necessary current expenses of operation and maintaining the System for the ensuing month.

(2) Sanitary Sewer Mortgage Revenue Bond Retirement Fund. The entire proceeds of the FmHA Loan shall be deposited upon receipt by the Village into the Sanitary Sewer Mortgage Revenue Bond Retirement Fund (the "Bond Retirement Fund"), which such fund is hereby established, and shall be used solely, for payment of principal and interest on the Bonds. If for any reason the amount on deposit in the Bond Retirement Fund is insufficient to pay all principal of and interest on the Bonds at maturity, then an amount equal to the deficiency shall be set aside and deposited in the Bond Retirement Fund out of the net revenues of the System in the then current month or ensuing months in order to retire the Bonds at the earliest possible time.

Surplus funds shall be retained in the Revenue Fund and may be used for making extensions or improvements to the System, redeeming outstanding Bonds, redeeming outstanding Bonds prior to maturity, paying other obligations issued to finance improvements to the System, and any other use of the revenues of the System authorized by law.

SECTION 6. The Bonds shall be designated as set forth in this ordinance, shall be payable in Federal Reserve Funds of the United States of America, shall be negotiable instruments, shall express upon their faces the purpose for which they are issued, and shall be issued pursuant to Section 12, Article XVIII, of the Constitution of the State of Ohio.

SECTION 7. The rates and charges for all services and facilities rendered by the System shall be reasonable and just, taking into consideration the costs and value of said System and the cost of maintaining, repairing and operating the same and the amounts necessary for the retirement of the Bonds, and there shall be charged such rates and charges as shall be adequate to meet the requirements of this section and the requirements of Section 5 hereof.

SECTION 8. The Village covenants and agrees so long as the Bonds hereby authorized remain unpaid as follows:

- (a) It will comply with applicable state laws and the regulations and continually operate and maintain the System in good condition.
- (b) No customer of the System, individual, corporation or municipality, shall receive free services or any service without being charged the rates prescribed in the rules and regulations of the System. The reasonable cost and value of any service rendered to

the Village and its inhabitants by the System, including reasonable charges for public health benefits, shall be paid for monthly as such service accrues out of the current revenues of the Village, exclusive of the revenues derived from the System.

- (c) It will maintain complete books and records relating to the operation of the System and its financial affairs and will cause such books and records to be audited biennially at the end of each fiscal year and an audit report prepared and will furnish any holder of the Bonds a copy of such report upon written request. At all reasonable times the holders of any Bonds shall have the right to inspect the System and the records, accounts and data relating thereto.
- (d) It will maintain such insurance coverage as may be customary for similar municipalities operating sanitary sewer systems similar to the System.
- (e) It will not transfer or use any portion of the FmHA Loan or the revenue derived in the operation of the System for any purpose not herein specifically authorized.
- (f) Except as otherwise specifically provided, so long as any such Bonds herein authorized are outstanding, no additional bonds or other obligations pledging any portion of the proceeds of the FmHA Loan or the revenues of said System shall be incurred or issued by the Village unless the same shall be junior and subordinate in all respects to the Bonds herein authorized.
- (g) It will not cause or permit any voluntary dissolution of its organization, merge or consolidate with any other municipality, dispose of or transfer its title to the System or any part thereof including lands and interest in lands, by sale, mortgage, lease or other encumbrance other than as provided in the Mortgage, as hereinafter defined.
- (h) Prior to the beginning of each fiscal year the Village will prepare an annual budget of said System for the ensuing fiscal year itemized on the basis of monthly requirements. A copy of such budget shall be mailed upon written request of any Bondholder.

- (i) The Village will comply in a timely manner with all terms, conditions and obligations of the FmHA Loan, will take all actions that may be available to it to realize the maximum possible amount of proceeds from the FmHA Loan for the System.
- (j) The Village will use its best efforts to issue temporary revenue bonds in such amount and bearing such terms as may be necessary to provide sufficient moneys to retire the Bonds at their maturity if the construction of the System is not then completed.
- (k) The Village will take all actions necessary to provide for the authorization, issuance, sale and delivery of its bonds to the FmHA or another issue of temporary revenue bonds or an issue of bonds to a purchaser other than the FmHA, in all such cases to be issued under authority of Section 12 of Article XVIII of the Constitution of the State of Ohio in a principal amount at least sufficient, after allowing for any other funds that may be available, or any other effective provisions that may have been made for the purpose, to retire all outstanding Bonds at their maturity, and will accept such price for the bonds or another issue of temporary revenue bonds and such interest rate or rates thereon as necessary to permit this to be done, within any limitations imposed by applicable law.
- (1) The provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a contract between the Village and the holders of any of the Bonds, and after the issuance of the Bonds this ordinance shall not be repealed or amended in any respect which will adversely affect the rights and interest of the holders, nor shall this council adopt any law, ordinance or resolution in any way adversely affecting the rights of the holders so long as the Bonds or interest thereon remains unpaid.

SECTION 9. If there shall be default in the payment of principal of or interest of any of the Bonds, upon the filing of a suit by any holder of any of the Bonds, any court having jurisdiction of the action may appoint a receiver to administer said System on behalf of the Village with power to charge and collect rates sufficient to provide for the payment of the Bonds and for the payment of operating expenses and to apply income and revenues in accordance with this ordinance, the Mortgage, as hereinafter defined, and franchise on default granted therein and the laws of Ohio.

The Village hereby agrees to transfer to any bona fide receiver or other subsequent operator of the System pursuant to any valid court order in a proceeding brought to enforce collection or payment of the obligations of the Village, a franchise not in excess of twenty (20) years as set forth in the hereinafter-defined Mortgage, all contracts and other rights of the Village conditionally for such time only as such receiver or operator shall operate by authority of the court.

Holders of twenty per centum (20%) of the outstanding Bonds in the event of default may require by mandatory injunction the raising of rates in a reasonable amount except as otherwise provided by law.

SECTION 10. The Village hereby grants to the holders of the Bonds or their representatives a mortgage upon all property, real, personal and mixed and revenue constituting the System of the Village, and hereby grants a franchise to the holders of the Bonds or their representatives or purchaser on foreclosure therefrom which shall extend for a period of twenty (20) years from the date of sale of such utility and franchise on foreclosure, all as contained in the Mortgage dated as of the date of the Bonds from the Village to the holder from time to time of the Bonds (the "Mortgage"). The mayor and clerk of the Village are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute and attest the Mortgage by and on behalf of the Village in such form as approved by such officers and the holder of the Bonds.

SECTION 11. The Bonds shall be sold by the mayor and clerk of the Village at not less than par plus accrued interest to Seasongood & Mayer, Cincinnati, Ohio, in accordance with their offer which is hereby accepted, and the mayor and the clerk of the Village are each separately authorized to enter into a bond purchase agreement with such firm for the purchase of the Bonds.

SECTION 12. This council, for and on behalf of the Village, hereby covenants that it will restrict the use of the proceeds of the Bonds hereby authorized in such manner and to such extent, if any, and take such other actions as are necessary, after taking into account reasonable expectations at the time the debt is incurred, so that they will not constitute obligations the interest on which is subject to federal income taxation or "arbitrage bonds" under Sections 103(b)(2) and 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and the regulations prescribed thereunder. The clerk, or any other officer having responsibility with respect to the appropriate certificate on behalf of the Village, on the date of delivery of the notes for inclusion in the transcript of

proceedings, setting forth the facts, estimates and circumstances and reasonable expectations pertaining to the use of the proceeds thereof and the provisions of said Sections 103(b)(2) and 148 and regulations thereunder.

SECTION 13. The Bonds are hereby designated as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" to the extent permitted by Section 265(b)(3) of the Code. This council finds and determines that the reasonable anticipated amount of qualified tax-exempt obligations (other than private activity bonds) which will be issued by the Village during the calendar year does not and the council hereby covenants that, during such year, the amount of tax-exempt obligations issued by the Village and designated as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" for such purpose will not exceed \$10,000,000. The clerk and other appropriate officers, and any of them, are authorized to take such actions and give such certifications on behalf of the Village with respect to the reasonably anticipated amount of tax-exempt obligations to be issued by the Village during this calendar year and with respect to such other matters as appropriate under Section 265(b)(3).

SECTION 14. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this council concerning and relating to the adoption of this ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this council, and that all deliberations of this council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with the law, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 15. All ordinances, resolutions and orders or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed, and each section of this ordinance is independent and the finding or holding of any section or subdivision hereof to be invalid or void shall not be deemed or held to affect the validity of any other section or subdivision of this ordinance.

SECTION 16. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary to protect the peace, health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the Village for the reason that immediate authorization of the Bonds is required to

provide for timely financing of the acquisition and construction of the System, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law after its passage.
