### Where Have All The Children Gone?

If you are like me, you saw data stating that up to 80% of parents wanted the schools to resume, yet when given that opportunity only about 40% actually sent their children back to school. I found a data analysis completed by EDUCATION WEEK that most will find just as strange. They looked through official attendance data from all the states and the District of Columbia. Only Delaware and Illinois did not have data needed. Therefore, no surprise, the results were never seen on local media (as

far as I know). Without the proper data from Illinois,the Union and Mayor cannot blame each other and they had no way to blame Trump -- he left things like this up to the governors. The surprising fact is that from data collected 1.3 million students never registered or attended classes this past year. How are we ever going to help these kids? The trends in enrollment have been going up in the South and the West and declining in the North. Why? Some academics say people are moving. Others point to a lower birth rate. But this loss

averages to 3% per state. The states least affected were Idaho, South Dakota, and Wyoming, who only lost .5% of students each. The states that lost the most were Mississippi, New Hampshire and Vermont, which lost more than

4.3% each. Students equal money for the local districts, some Federal, some State. But it is dependent on attendance. Most states have given the School Boards a hold blameless on attendance drops. But all districts are worried about next

Long Beach, CA is spending money on more social workers and psychologists to try and convince more to return to class and help those who do. The Detroit Public Schools set up 110 learning centers with internet access and they still lost 3.7% of their enrollment. It is up to the parents to get their kids to school. CPS has agreed to let most, if not all, students who attended school to be promoted. The large question remains for those who sat home without signing in.

Of these 1.3 million school age children there are those that have extenuating circumstances. We need to do like Long Beach did and hire the necessary auxiliary personnel to help find those kids in Illinois though we don't know how many, to help them return. Sad to say, there is a feeling that some had their caregiver, parent or whoever, die during this period, maybe even Covid related and no one in the family was capable of

helping.

Have a great 4th of
July and if you are lucky enough to share this holiday with your family, make sure that all your nieces, nephews, and other school age children have attended school. Maybe you are their connection to return.

### Free Bike Riding Classes For Adults



The Chicago Department of Transportation is expanding its "Learn to Bike Ride" educational program for adults by adding more opportuni-ties through an advanced level course, and launchlevel course, and launching a new feature that will help adults "Learn to Commute." The public can sign up for free classes taught by CDOT's Streets Are For Everybody Ambassadors that are spheduled at three levels and the second support of th are scheduled at three locations through the end of

August.

The growth in interest in bike-riding in the last year is attributed in part to the COVID-19 pan-demic that has caused the public to seek out safe and socially-distanced forms of transportation and recre-

CDOT and its bike-share system Divvy last year launched a citywide expansion, starting on the far South Side in 2020, and extending to the Southwest and Northwest Sides in 2021. The expansion sion included the intro-duction of 3,500 new e-bikes last year, with another 3,500 coming in 2021. CDOT added 29 miles of new bikeways in 2020, about half of them in the Divvy expansion areas. CDOT is finalizing installation plans for 2021 but expects to complete about 40 miles of new bikeways in the year.
These free bicycle rid-

ing classes, which are funded through Divvy sponsorship revenue from the City's bikeshare part-ner Lyft, are offered to anyone 16-years-old or over. The two-hour class allows pre-registered participants to learn how to position themselves when riding in the bike lane. how to plan the safest routes, signaling and
