President Biden, there is

We must protect our children in these and other situations. The decisions made will affect everyone in the school. While you think you might have control, it comes down to votes. You may know your State Rep, Senator or Congressman in Washington or Springfield, it does not matter. They often vote as the "big boys" tell them to. Let them know your opinions. Most do not contact their officials and regrettably few know how they will vote. We, our children and grandchildren deserve better. Do not be one of those people that vote only because he or she is a Democrat or Republican, a man or woman, or their ethnicity.

Federal Option For Student Loan

Attorney General Kwame Raoul applauded passage of his legislation to ensure that student loan borrowers select a student loan option that best meets their financial needs. Know Before You Owe legislation was passed by the Illinois House of Representa-tives' Higher Education Committee and will ensure that student borrowers have information about their eligibility for federal aid before they turn to more costly pri-

vate loans. Recent federal data shows that more than half of undergraduate students took out a private student loan even though they still had eligibility for federal student loans. Private student loans offer fewer borrower protections, less flexible repayment options and generally cost more. The legislation encourages borrowers to determine whether they have exhausted their federal loan options before

taking out private loans. Although student loan borrowers have faced the economic impact of the pandemic, federal loan borrowers have had access to more relief. Since March 2020, the federal government has provided automatic relief by pausing federal student loan payments and wage garnishments, and the interest rate has been lowered to 0%.

Historically, aquatic plants propagated in tanks in the Conservatory were planted outside, in artificiallyheated lily ponds. The exotic plants were so popular that in 1897, the Egyptian government requested seeds from Lincoln Park's water

CPS Releases Attendance Rates

Chicago Public Schools announced that an average of 73 percent of students who were expected to attend in person at district schools between March 8th and March 12th were in attendance. Pre-k and students enrolled in cluster programs saw the largest gains in the school-based attendance rate, starting with 55 percent on February to 69 percent on March 12, with a high of

74 percent on March 9. The district's attendance release includes data by grade corresponding to when the student group phased in between Feb. 11th — the first day of in-person learning for pre-k and students enrolled in cluster programs and March 12th, when students in grades 6-8 were able to return to inperson learning. Data from pre-k and students enrolled in cluster programs represent the most complete picture of attendance progress since they have been in school the longest, while grades K-5 represent two weeks and grades 6-8 represent one week of data. Of the 59,302 students expected to appear in-person as of March 12th, 49,281 attended in-person learning at least one day between Feb. 11th and March
