Gift shop volunteers are working one daily shift, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Thursday and we are now open to the public. Whether or not you plan to return to active duty, we need to hear from you, and we DO WANT YOU BACK!

VISIT OUR GIFT SHOP

Here are a few notables for 2021 and this year's first quarter:

Your 2020 officers have remained active during the Covid-19 crisis and graciously have extended their terms of office. The following executive committee officers have maintained business in order to keep our organization operational: Gregg Ferran, President; Liz Sanchez, Director of Adult Volunteers; Sandy Giron, Secretary; Liz Romero, Gift Shop Manager; and Dolores Roybal, Treasurer. Special thanks to Gift Shop Treasurer, Belinda Gutierrez.

In January of last year, we had one volunteer working seven hours. This has increased to 24 volunteers working 607 hours in December. Our total hours for 2021 were 4,017. Thank you, Mary Agnes, for these statistics. Before Covid-19 and in contrast, we had volunteer hours numbering well in excess of 20,000 and had a total of 104 volunteers. Only two new auxilians has joined our ranks. Unfortunately, in the last 18 months, we have lost a total of 11 auxilians. Nine of these auxilians were honored at the last New Mexico Hospital Association's memorial ceremony in September 2021. Sadly, two more auxilians have passed since that event. Rest in peace Rita Abeyta and Mary Beth Shymkus. Rita was the Healthplex manager, and Mary Beth worked at the Information Desk.

We are pleased to report a number of huge accomplishments for the gift shop in 2021. In late March, the gift shop reopened with nine volunteers. In July, we were able to open to the public with morning and afternoon shifts. Liz Romero and Liz Sanchez were able to attend the Las Vegas Market in August 2021 and January 2022. A drawing of handmade goods and New Mexico themed-baskets was held on December 23 raising \$2,430. In addition, the gift shop was able to donate \$36,000 to the general fund despite closures and shorter shifts. Such a large gift in these times is truly unbelievable! Thank you, gift shop volunteers!

"La Buena Gente", your fellow auxilians have found creative ways to keep busy and create community goodwill. Auxilians sold tickets, donated items, handmade items for sale in the gift shop. They made masks, volunteered for events (flu shot clinics), donated care packages for hospital departments, and painted rocks and strategically placed them about town. You all know who you are, again, thank you!

Events such as Lobby Sales and the Hollyberry Fair will most likely not occur this year. The fall Volunteer Appreciation & Awards may or may not be held. This year, the auxiliary has resumed the distribution of scholarships and may consider small hospital grants. The number of scholarship applicants has been reduced.

Thankfully, volunteers with the Advanced Care Planning coordinated by Cheryl Marita continues. Thank you, Liz Sanchez and Beaulah Sandoval. We may have a new opportunity to distribute food in the future, please call Liz Sanchez for more information.

New Mexico Hospital Association's (NMHA) Auxiliary/Volunteer Component has replaced Gregg Ferran as president with our own Sheryl Wise-Trujillo. Please congratulate her! Contact Sheryl for dates and more information about and our annual, statewide meeting in the fall. Our treasurer, Dolores Roybal also serves on the planning committee. Five auxilians represented our auxiliary at the annual meeting held at Sandia Resort and Casino last year. The NMHA's officers created a comprehensive database listing all of the state's 35 auxiliaries and volunteer programs. Please consider serving at the state level.

We are in sound financial standing. If you have any questions, please contact Dolores Roybal, Treasurer.


We are grateful for all auxilians and for their continued prayers and well wishes as we continue to be challenged in 2022. For those active volunteers, we cannot thank you enough!



t is hard to believe two years have gone by since we all were together. In a blink of an eye, we each went our own separate ways. Now, we need to regroup slowly. As we started to come back to the gift shop, we were open and then, we would

have to close. Now since we are working only one shift Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., we are hoping we can start



opening on Friday. We will need to have more volunteers come back to give us a hand.

I interviewed two auxilians – Ubaldo and Cynthia Gallegos – husband and wife. Cynthia is training in the gift shop and Ubaldo is going to train with the Northern Roots program on Thursday afternoons. He is also interested in volunteering in the gift shop. I will interview another prospective volunteer the middle of April. Please come by and give them a warm welcome. Ubaldo and Cynthia, we are glad to have you join the auxiliary family.

On Thursday, March 31, 2022, I met with Carrie Thielen, Manager of Regional Community Health to talk about the possibility of having volunteers assist with the new food program at Presbyterian Española Hospital. She went over how the program works. The program is new to PEH. *Northern Roots: Where Families Eat, Learn and Grow* provides produce prescriptions to families through a provider referral. Patients receive 16-weeks of no-cost fruits and vegetables, nutrition education and resources. The program just opened the new food site at PEH a couple of weeks ago where families can pick up their weekly food. The food site is in the east side of the lobby and is open every Thursday from 2-4. We have 15 patients picking up weekly, and that is growing. Ms. Thielen is in hopes that we can have two auxilians volunteer weekly. Ms. Thielen says that more help will be needed as the programs grows. This is a great way to interact with our patients.

Beaulah and I are still active with the Advanced Care Program. We are coming back to work after being out since the holiday. We work a couple of hours one day per week. Our office is across the Healthplex. We will be holding an open house on April 19 and 20, 2022, so that the employees, staff, and volunteers can see what our program is about. Cheryl Mari ta oversee the program in Española. She spoke to us about the program. We can use more volunteers in this area.

We are in hopes that you will return to your service areas once they reopen. Should you decide not to return, you must turn in your volunteer badge and Healthplex badge if you have one. The badges are property of the hospital and need to be accounted for. I also report to Presbyterian Main who is active each month. Feel free to drop off your badge(s) in an envelope addressed to Liz Sanchez and leave at the Gift Shop. We appreciate the time you gave to the auxiliary, hospital, and community.

The scholarship committee granted three scholarships for the spring 2022 to outstanding students attending New Mexico Highlands University, Northern New Mexico College, and the University of New Mexico. We wish these students a successful educational journey. As we witnessed during the pandemic, our state is in dire need for medical professionals.

One big highlight for 2021 was having Rich Catanach as Our Auxilian of the Year. Congratulations, again, Rich for an outstanding job!

As always, I am so appreciative of your support during 2021. The year was a tough one. So many of you helped our hospital, community, and fellow auxilians with your talents and words of comfort. I continue learning from you. I look forward to a productive healthy, and happy 2022 and working side by side. You are welcomed to call on me if you need help or just have a suggestion or just want to say hello.

Advanced Care Planning

A wonderful opportunity is available to all thee PEH Auxiliary. Presbyterian Advanced Care Planning team (ACH) expanded a year ago to include Presbyterian Española Hospital. Beaulah Sandoval and Liz Sanchez are the first two facilitators on our PEH team. We are now able to offer the opportunity to other members of the PEH Auxiliary. We collaborate closely with Tamra Williams, Coordinator of ACP for PHS and Cheryl Marita, RN, PEH Palliative Care. The goal of the ACP program is to help our community members complete their Advanced Directives.

What ACP Facilitators do:

 Follow up on referrals received from doctors, nurses, and staff on any Presbyterial Medical Group (PMG) patients at Española PMG.

2. Make phone calls, sometimes Zoom meetings, with the person and/or family to go through the forms, step by step.

3. Mail packets and information to each person.

4. Learn more about themselves and our community about our personal goals and values.

The Benefits of becoming an ACP Facilitator:

1. Hours can vary as to your needs

2. A private office is provided for you to make phone calls. At this time, all visits are done by phone, so no face-to-face visits are involved.

3. The gratitude of each family as they accomplish what they have been putting off for years

4. The impact on the doctors and staff of PEH who know a resource is available for their patients to help in a challenging process

5. Your own learning of what is important to you as you move through the decades of life changes

How to become an ACP Facilitator:

1. Reach out to Liz Sanchez (505-927-4369)

2. Interview with Tamra Williams by phone or zoom

3. Orientate with Tamra to insure you are comfortable with every step in the process

What skills do you need to be a success as an ACP Facilitator?

1. Ability to talk comfortably on the phone about decision making regarding advanced care planning

2. Ability to listen and move at the person's own speed

3. Ability to support someone making choices for themselves without interference

4. Ability to be proud of the work you do with individuals and families

Gift Shop Section "We were able to donate \$36,000 to the Auxiliary!"

The Gift Shop reopened on March 29, 2021. Our hours were 10 am to 2 pm. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. We started with nine volunteers.

On May 24, 2021, we were open from Monday through Friday from 10 am to 2 pm.

On July 6, 2021, we were able to do two shifts from Monday through Friday, closing the second shift on Friday afternoon.

Liz Sanchez and I attended the Las Vegas Market in August 2021. We ordered several items including Christmas items.

We held sales every week. Shirley Chiello donated homemade Afghans and baby items. Sandy and Belinda donated handmade trinket and jewelry boxes, crosses, bird houses, and fairy gardens of assorted styles. These items are from reclaimed wood and carpenter's scrap. They used different types of wood to make them—aspen to rosewood. These handmade items were a big hit. We sold 53 bird houses.

We held a drawing on the 23rd of December. The six prizes donated consisted of a quilt from Manny Valdez; a blanket crocheted by Shirley Chiello; two baskets from gift shop volunteers; a nativity from the gift shop, and a handmade table from our own Sandy Giron. We raised \$2,430. Sennie Quintana donated \$80, and Eddie Romero donated \$100.

Although we only open part of the year, our sales for 2021 were incredibly good. We were able to donate \$36,000 to the Auxiliary!


