The Air National Guard were the first to respond and they sent two F16s as soon as they could. This is what patriotic people do. They do their best to help each other regardless of Religion color etc. I have friends who lost several people that day, and they tell me they fly their flag every Patriot Day to remember those caught in the buildings and those that worked and prayed for them. There are presently very good memorials at these locations. It would be good to view them. Our kids deserve to know our history.
