Comics Exhibit At Cultural Center



Chicago: Where Comics Came to Life (1880-1960) is on exhibit at the Chicago Cultural Center, 78 E. Washington st., Sidney Yates Gallery, 4th Floor North through Oct. 3rd.

Chicago's role in the development of the early comic strip is evident through its countless newspapers and publishing industry, The city led the transformation of comics from daily fantasy and joke features into ongoing stories grounded in the textures and details of real life, its first real step towards legitimacy as an expressive language and semi-literary art form.

Curated by artist and author Chris Ware, and Chicago Cultural Historian Emeritus, Tim Samuelson, this exhibition is designed and planned as an intentional historical companion to the concurrently appearing survey of contemporary Chicago comics at the Museum of Contemporary Art, in which Ware's work also appears.

Lottery Awards For Vaccinated

Governor Pritzker announced \$10 million 'All In for the Win' promotion that will reward vaccinated Illinoisans by automatically entering them into a series of cash and scholarship lotteries with prizes up to \$1 million.

More than 70% of Illinois adults have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, ac-cording to the CDC, making Illinois the first state in the Midwest to reach President Biden's goal.

All In for the Win offers \$7 million in cash prizes to vaccinated adults, ranging from \$100,000 to \$1 million, and \$3 million in scholarship awards to vaccinated youth, held in Bright Start 529 College Savings Plan.

There are no sign ups, no forms, and no lines to wait in. Residents were encouraged to get vaccinated before July 1st to ensure they would be entered into every draw, in-cluding the first million-dollar top prize on July 8th.



Chicago Celebrates \$15 Minimum Wage

Mayor Lori E. Light-foot joined City officials, workers, labor leaders, and worker advocacy groups to celebrate a historic raise for Chicago workers while calling on the federal government and corporate partners to ensure that all workers receive a living wage. Ef-fective July 1st, the Chicago minimum wage increases to \$15 an hour for most workers, four years earlier than the rest of Illinois. Domestic workers will benefit from the \$15 minimum wage starting on August 1st.

Effective today, workers at businesses with 21 or more employees will be guaranteed a minimum wage of \$15 an hour, while workers at busi-nesses with 4-20 employwill see their ees minimum wage raised to \$14 an hour as part of a gradual move to a \$15 an hour by 2023.


