As an advisory board, we are striving to bring hospitals back into service, while learning new skills and adapting to new


I attended the NMHA Strategic Planning retreat at the Inn of the Mountain God's in Ruidoso, New Mexico, on June 9-10, 2022.


- 1 package—Free Range Chicken Drumsticks
- ½ teaspoon—Seasoned Salt Blend
- 1 teaspoon—Olive Oil (or canola)
- 1—Large Red Bell Pepper (diced, 1 1/2 cups)
- 1— Small Onion (diced, 3/4 cup)
- 1 clove Garlic (minced)
- 1 ¾ cups—Reduced Sodium Chicken Broth (14 oz. can)
- 1 cup Corn Kernels (frozen)
- 1 cup 10 Minute (cook brown rice)

#### **Directions**

1. Evenly coat chicken drumsticks with seasoned salt. Heat oil in a large skillet on medium heat; brown chicken about 10 minutes, turning several times. Remove from pan and set aside.

- 2. Add peppers, onion, and garlic to pan. Cook, stirring frequently until softened, about 5 minutes.
- 3. Stir in broth, corn, and rice. Return chicken to pan; bring to a simmer over medium-low heat. Cover and cook 12-15 minutes until chicken is 180 degrees Fahrenheit internal temperature. Uncover and stir rice to absorb any remaining liquid. 5.
