

This time of "woke" it is hard to know every word that is respectful. A very recent Gallop Poll came out with a few interesting words to share. County Deaths Exceed 11,000

The Cook County Examiner's Medical Office confirmed the 11,000th death due to COVID-19 infection on Aug. 3rd.

The 10,999th death was a 31-year-old African American man from the Austin neighborhood. The 11,000th case was a 28-year-old Latino man who resided in Little Village.

Since June 26th, COVID cases have have increased by 30% in Cook County and the positivity rate jumped from 0.7% to 3.18%. İllinois saw an overall 131% spike in COVID-19 cases in the past two weeks. The seven-day average of cases in Illinois topped 2,000 per day for the first time since May.

Amendments To Eviction Order

The Illinois Supreme Court announced amendments to Order M.R. 30370 concerning residential evictions. These amendments clarify th eorder on July 15th, 2021, which announced the winding down of the eviction moratorium in Illi-

nois.
The Court Operations
During Covid-19 Task
Force recognized there was a need to clarify Paragraph 2 of the July 15th order exempting from the temporary stay those cases that invovle a direct threat to the health and safety of other tenants or an immediate and severe risk to property. The amended order does this and brings the July 15th order in line with the Govenor's Executive Orders, which permit the filing and enforcement of

eviction cases involving a direct threat. The order was further

amended to make it clear that all eviction actions may be filed and set for return dates and status dates during the 30-day stay period. The temporary stay only applies to dispositive hearings, trials on the merits, and judgments. The primary goal of the Task Force in recommending amendments to the order was to get cases filed and before judges who would be able to direct litigants to the resources available through the Governor's program - rental assistance and financial assistance to tenants and landlords alike - such as Eviction Help Illinois.

The triage period began on August 1st, 2021 period and will conclude on Sept. 1st, 2021, when the order

is vacated. Amended Order M.R. 30370 is avilable on the Court website illinoiscourts.gov.



Assistance For Eviction Process

As the moratorium on filing eviction cases has been lifted, Cook County Sheriff Thomas J. Dart is reminding housing providers and tenants grappling with eviction that they can access the Office's Community Resource Center for assistance in services and financial help.

Team members work with the public to help individuals navigate social services, housing, employment, medical and mental health services and government rental assistance. The CRC is currently operating virtually and can be reached at (773) 405-5116, or email at ccso.resourcecenter@ ccsheriff.org or online at www.cookcountysheriff. org/crc/home.

The Office is taking to address the resumption of evictions after a moratorium that began in March 2020. With significant government rental assistance available, the Office has instituted a policy requiring property owners to confirm there is no forthcoming assistance before an eviction will be enforced. Social workers are on staff to offer assistance during the eviction enforcement process.

Birth Control Over the Counter

Governor JB Pritzker signed HB 0135 into law, granting Illinoisans access to birth control over the counter. The legislation removes barriers to care that may have previously prevented residents from accessing hormonal contraception, including lack of access to a physician willing to prescribe birth control.

HB 0135 also expands Medicaid to cover over the counter birth control costs for plans that currently cover physician pre-scribed birth control. Pharmacists are required to receive training on how to counsel individuals on the variety of birth control options available. To ensure the price of

contraception remains feasible, HB 0135 includes mandates for insurance policies regulated by the State to cover birth control that is dispensed by a pharmacist. The law is effective

Art Exhibit At Morton Arboretum



The Morton Arboretum's new outdoor art exhibition, Human+ Nature connects people and trees.

Renowned Daniel Popper created five 15- to 26-foot-tall sculptures that will be featured in various locations across its 1,700 acres, leading guests to areas they may not have explored before.

On the East Side, a short walk from the Visitor Center, guests will be able to step within a huge female figure, as if into the heart of nature. Continuing along a less than mile-long walk, they will encounter a majestic maternal figure as tall as a tree, and a sculpture of diverse human facial traits interwoven with root

structures. On the West Side, two hands joined by intertwining roots will extend near a grove of old oaks, and a towering face will evoke the interconnectedness of humans and trees. Made of glass-reinforced concrete, fiberglass, and steel, each sculpture will weigh several metric tons. The largest ground footprint will be 28 feet wide and 37 feet long.

Trees have the power to refresh and restore people, to connect them to the natural world. They provide clean air to breathe, shade to cool, and beauty that can bring joy and relaxation. In turn, trees need people to care for them if they are to thrive and share their benefits.

Daniel Popper is a multidisciplinary artist known for his larger-thanlife sculptures. Cape Town, South Africa, he is most acclaimed for his massive public art installations, including the memorial sculpture for Nelson Mandela School of Science and Technology in the Eastern Cape of South Africa, and sculptures for popular events such as the Boom Festival in Portugal and Rainbow Serpent Festival in Australia.

Human+Nature is included with timed-entry admission to the Arboretum. The exhibition is planned to run for at least one year. Visit mor-
